His passing left a significant void in their lives, and his six children now navigate life with courage beyond their years. Fifteen-year-old Rakesh, the only son, took it upon himself to support the family. He dropped out of school and started selling mobile covers, ensuring his mother and five sisters had food on the table.

Amongst these hundred thousand people, there's a family of 8 who arrived at the Signature Bridge Camp in 2017. When they arrived, they were amongst the lucky ones.

In this journey of courage and hope, Mr. Mathukumalli Vidyasagar stepped up these sisters.

Through HAI's 'Sponsor a Child' campaign, he has been donating 3001 INR monthly to the holistic support development of both Siksha and Kirtana. This small but significant amount helps cover their educational materials, and other transportation. essential needs, allowing them to focus entirely on their studies. With every rupee of his donation, Mr. Vidyasagar is not just providing education- he is restoring dignity, hope, and confidence to these young girls.

The transformation is evident. Today, Siksha and Kirtana walk to class with their heads held high, dressed in neat, well-fitting uniforms. Their love for dance and art continues to flourish, proving that even in the toughest circumstances, dreams can survive when given the right support.

This Republic Day was particularly special for the sisters. With pride in their hearts, they stood alongside their peers to hoist the national flag, embracing India as their even new home. Thev showcased their love for dance, performing in front of their community with radiant smiles.

None of this would have been possible without Mr. Vidyasagar's unwavering generosity. His commitment to supporting the education of these young girls is breaking the generational cycle of hardship that once defined their lives.
